I am passionate about working to improve the mental health and wellbeing of the young people and staff at Ernest Bevin College.


I deliver weekly scheduled one-to-one counselling sessions for students, as well as offering drop-in sessions for any students that feel they need some emotional support on the day. As well as my counselling work with students, I also offer a supervision space for staff after college.

The College is committed to promoting and protecting positive emotional wellbeing and mental health for both its students and staff members. In the coming weeks we will be rolling out our peer wellbeing ambassador program and reapplying for the Wellbeing Award for Schools.

In order to regain the Wellbeing Award, we need feedback from students, staff, governors and parents. We will soon be sending out an evaluation form and we would really appreciate it if you are able to complete this so that we have the feedback we need to be able to continue to improve mental health and wellbeing at the College.

I hope that together with your support, Ernest Bevin College can be a community that leads the way in breaking the stigma surrounding mental health.

In 2009, the Wandsworth Secondary School Librarians Group decided to launch their very own Book Award for the borough. At that time, many of the secondary schools 'shadowed' the Carnegie Book Award, the most prestigious national children's book award. However, there was frustration among students and librarians that although they were shadowing the Carnegie, students really had no influence over what books were included on the shortlist and ultimately which book won the award. Often, students were not keen on the shortlisted books and the books that they did like did not win the award.

The Fabulous Book Award, or FAB as it is locally known, is a completely student-led award. Students (with help from their school librarians) put forward nominations for a longlist that is published in October. Students then vote for the books they would like to see on the shortlist. The shortlist is published in early December and students read as many books as they can from the shortlist over the next few months. In March, a final vote is taken from students for their favourite book, culminating in an end event/ceremony in March where the winner of the FAB Award is announced. This event is always attended by at least 2-3 of the authors on the shortlist which makes the event even more special for the students who have been reading the books.

Criteria for nominations for the longlist are childrens/teenage fiction books published in paperback during the previous year. The award has been designed to be both inclusive and to give students a voice in the world of literature. As a consequence, our long and shortlists always contain a wide range of books that appeal to a diverse pool of Wandsworth students.

The 2022 shortlist will be announced in December, but in the meantime we already have three of the books in the library: **Gay Club!** by Simon James Green, **The Dark Lady** by Akala and **The Upper World** by Femi Fadugba.

The full longlist is on display at the back of the newsletter.

## 'The Demon Headmaster' Book Review



Ashamed of himself, the Demon Headmaster was no longer a headmaster and quit on the spot. Dinah was also officially adopted by the Hunter family.



On Friday November 11, Year 8 attended a Remembrance Day event at St Mary Magdalene Church.

Combined Cadet Force (CCF) members led the way to the church, following their own remembrance ceremony at the College in the morning.

The event was led by Ms. Lewis and the Reverend Philippa Boardman, with Year 11 students also reciting poetry and war memorial readings.

Two members of the congregation who lived through the Second World War attended and engaged in discussions with the students after the service, sharing their wartime experiences and answering any questions students had.



This term, students were asked if there were any charity initiatives that they wished to take part in. The students decided that they wanted to take part in Odd Socks Day, an anti-bullying week initiative, and to donate the money raised to CARAS, a Tooting-based charity supporting refugees and asylum-seekers who live in South West London.

# Creative Arts Focus

Creative Arts has been on a rapid journey since its launch at the start of the academic year. We have had the joy of reintroducing Music lessons to the college curriculum and have welcomed students on a carousel between Music, Art and Drama.

## Drama

Students in Year 7 have explored how to use theatrical techniques, including Still Image and Narration, to help them communicate a story to an audience of their peers. They have now moved on to developing a clear and concise character using voice and physicality whilst following the story of a family whose annual holiday takes a turn for the worse at every possible moment, from being stuck in traffic to being marooned on an island awaiting rescue.

Year 9 began by arriving in the year 2121 as they explored the use of new types of narration and monologues. This half term, they are looking at mask work using Trestle Theatre Masks. This brings a new way of physicalising a character whilst looking at new and interesting ways of performing both with and without spoken words.




## Art

Year 7 began the year with the formal elements of Art, including texture, line, colour, shape and tone, and drawing. They have now moved on to looking at The Day of the Dead whilst applying the skills and techniques they have already learnt, alongside some new ones.

Year 8 studied the artist Charles Bell in the first half term whilst creating their own artist

research pages and own versions of the artists' work. Students are now exploring observational drawing whilst using biscuits and chocolate bar wrappers to create their own multi-media (different artistic mediums) copy of the wrapper.



## Music

As Music is a re-introduction and is the first time Key Stage 3 students have had the opportunity to learn Music, both Year 8 and Year 9 have begun the year in similar ways. Year 8 started the year exploring Rhythm and Pulse and have now moved on to Kpanlogo, a Ghanaian style of music which combines percussion and singing. Year 9 started the year with Kpanlogo and are now exploring chords with keyboards.

Student feedback has been extremely positive on the return of Music and students are thoroughly enjoying learning with Mr Bello.

We are establishing a full programme of opportunities both in and outside of the college. It is our aim to ensure that all students in Key Stage 3 have the chance to see live theatre, visit an art Gallery and take part in music workshops each year.
